

Dear Sirs.

Please accept this document as a formal objection to the proposed boundary changes intended for the NSW division of CALARE.

I believe that the people of the Central Tablelands will be adversely affected by splitting this distinct geographical and cultural region into two separate electorates. Political representation of the voters of this region would be best served by a single representative to consolidate growth and infrastructure development rather that a divisive "Western Central Tablelands" linked with the Slopes & Plains and the "Eastern Central Tablelands" linked with the Blue Mountains.

I accept the requirement to reduce the number of NSW seats, but disagree with radically changing a seat that currently meets the statistical tolerance requirements, and is a clear geographical and social region. In fact, this region has a higher population growth than the state average, and I believe that this trend will not only continue – but increase.

The reason for sustained growth in this area is because there currently exists a well established community of interest within the Central Tablelands based on the following:

#### 1. Education

Education is the largest employer in the area, with Charles Sturt University

— which has a Campus at both Orange, and a concentration of Private
Schools, and strong Public Schools in Bathurst & Orange that service
young people throughout the region. There are sporting and academic ties

that are centred on Bathurst and Orange. In fact, the Western Region Academy of Sport is based in Bathurst services the entire central west.

## 2. Transport

The highway & rail infrastructure from Orange, Blayney & Oberon converges on Bathurst before linking with Sydney via the mountains.

The ongoing upgrades to the Great Western Highway have made it more of an expressway across the mountains, and easier to bypass communities in the mountains completely.

Should a major upgrade occur to the Bells Line of Road, this will further decrease contact between people travelling to Sydney from the Central Tablelands and those living in the mountains.

## 3. Industry

There are major established companies such as Simplot, Devro, Masterfoods in Bathurst, Carter Holt Harvey in Oberon, and Electrolux in Orange that supply direct employment to people throughout the region, plus the supporting contractor groups that service the Central Tablelands Region.

There exists a network of contractors, suppliers and expertise in this region that rivals that in Sydney in all but the most specialised of services. While they may be based in any of the centres, they service business interests in all of the other Central Tablelands Centres.

Any demand for these types of services across the mountains is serviced in the main by Sydney contractors.

## 4. Health

Development of new Hospitals at Bathurst & Orange with complimentary services

Existing Private Hospitals at both Bathurst & Orange are referred to by Doctors throughout the region.

Any specialist work not available in either Orange of Bathurst is carried out in Sydney. The Blue Mountains is part of the route to Sydney only – not part of the area health service.

## 5. Retail

Shoppers regularly commute between Blayney/Bathurst/Orange/Oberon – a clear shopping catchment that would be split in half by the proposed boundary.

6. LGA

The recent changes to LGA boundaries have tried to reinforce established

community interests and this should continue. To split the Bathurst LGA is

contradictory to the Report of the Distribution committee that has "sought

to keep electors in their existing divisions wherever it could be equitably

achieved".

In summary, I view the proposed changes to Calare by placing an electoral

boundary through the middle of the Bathurst LGA as being divisive to the voters

in the region, and not supportive of a cohesive development of infrastructure and

community of interest based around the Central Tablelands region rather than all

things focused towards Sydney.

I would also ask the committee to hold a public inquiry at Bathurst, in order to

provide voters the opportunity to present their concerns for consideration by the

committee.
