Objection to the potential naming of the new Southern ACT electorate.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide an objection to the proposed naming of the new electorate.

My objection is based on comments based on excerpts from the book, "Charles Bean: If People Really Knew" by Ross Coulthart and also comments made by Coultart in a Radio National broadcast

The proposed name, (Bean), for the new ACT southern electorate is not appropriate for the following reasons:

- Charles Bean on several occasions attempted to undermine Sir John Monash's
 military leadership in World War 1 on the basis of his Jewish heritage. Bean wrote,
 "We do not want Australia represented by men mainly because of their ability, natural
 and inborn in Jews, to push themselves". Bean also condemned Monash's "Jewish
 capacity for worming silently into favour without seeming to take any steps towards
 it.";
- According to Coulthart, "Bean did what he could to have Monash removed from his command". Fortunately, he did not succeed. Monash was later knighted on the battle field for "shortening the war". Monash is probably Australia's greatest military commander;
- Many in the Australian community will resent having an electorate named after a
 person who was known to have anti-Semitic views that could have impacted on
 Monash's efforts. Whether such views were acceptable then is irrelevant, they
 should never have been acceptable;
- The new electorate will encompass the existing suburb of Monash. Given Bean's animosity towards Sir John Monash, it would be insulting and hurtful to those who respect the dedication of our most famous soldier if the electorate is named after Charles Bean; and
- If it is important to have an electorate named after a significant ACT based historian perhaps you could consider Manning Clark, the author of the most known history of Australia

Note: The AEC website indicates that Charles "Bean was Australia's official correspondent to the Australian Imperial Force after winning an Australian Journalists Association ballot."
