Objection by the City of Port Adelaide Enfield to the abolition of the name Port Adelaide as a Federal Electoral Division.

At its meeting on 8 May 2018 the City of Port Adelaide Enfield unanimously resolved as follows;

ITEM 12.3.14 SOUTH AUSTRALIAN FEDERAL ELECTORAL REDISTRIBUTION CONSULTATION

Mayor Johanson moved that Council resolves:

- 1. The Director Corporate Services' report titled "South Australian Federal Electoral Redistribution Consultation" be received and noted.
- 2. The Administration prepare and submit a response indicating Council's support for the name of Port Adelaide to be retained for a Federal electoral division in support of the areas historic and contemporary significance to South Australia.
- Cr. Boan seconded

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

Of the 11 electoral divisions currently held in South Australia, 9 did not meet the distribution requirements. The division of Port Adelaide was one of two divisions which did meet the requirements. For this reason an argument could be made to retain Port Adelaide as an electoral division in its own right. Recognising that the recommendation from the Commission is to abolish the Port Adelaide division, it is important to the City of Port Adelaide Enfield seek to continue to have a division named Port Adelaide. The Mayor has also expressed his support for retaining the name of Port Adelaide – **(Refer Attachment 1)**

Port Adelaide has historic and contemporary significance to South Australia and there are many reasons why retaining a federal electoral division of Port Adelaide is important to our state and nation. The Port Adelaide Federal electorate was established in 1949. The historic buildings, tall ships, quaint laneways, museums, river dolphins, the lighthouse and industrial sheds are iconic attractions and landmarks that enhance Port Adelaide's harbour lifestyle. The community of Port Adelaide has deep roots, with many families living in the area for several generations. Pride in Port Adelaide can be seen in the relationships and connections between community, our celebration of local history, our care for the local environment and our appreciation for our strong Aboriginal culture and history.

Being the closest major port to the city of Adelaide, Port Adelaide has been an economic and industrial hub for South Australia and has been one of the state's primary employment locations at various points in its time. Today, Port Adelaide is the centre for considerable local, state, national and international investment, with long term plans for ongoing investment in infrastructure relating to defence, transport and other key industries. Relationships of national importance such as with Cherbourg in France for ship and submarine building will bring a \$50 billion investment and approximately 6000 new jobs to the state, with economic opportunities for several decades into the future. China, South East Asia and India

have been recognised by the state and federal governments as important links for trade and economic opportunities. These relationships focused around Port Adelaide will have a significant impact on the prosperity and opportunities available to South Australians. These opportunities extend to the sporting and leisure realms with the Port Adelaide Football Club, South Australia's second AFL club, generating positive social connections, encouraging active communities, developing international connections including with China, and actively reconnecting communities to our Aboriginal heritage.

High numbers of new arrivals are choosing to make the Port Adelaide region their home, bringing new culture, food and festivities for our residents and visitors to enjoy. Growth in the division of Port Adelaide has been recorded as 13.22 percent (June 2012-2016). The local economy has enjoyed a boost in recent times with many small to medium sized businesses moving to, or reinvesting in a long future in Port Adelaide.

Both major political parties within South Australia indicated in their suggestions that they were supportive of retaining the division and name of Port Adelaide.

As highlighted above the City of Port Adelaide Enfield support the retention of the name of Port Adelaide as a Federal electoral division. It's important that we continue to mark Port Adelaide as a strong and significant area, and a Federal electoral division under the name of Port Adelaide will further support a bright future for the state.
